textile research and teach. She produces functional items and wall work for exhibition and commission.

She thinks of herself as a weaver and gets as much pleasure from weaving a towel as from weaving a wall piece. Because she is a weaver, the product makes little difference. The manipulation of interlacements into new configurations gives her great pleasure. Her satisfaction comes from creating something that will be touched by others and give pleasure to their life.

She is a painter of sorts. Her advantage is that she creates the surface she's working on and she uses dye instead of paint. She is more involved/intimate/conscious of the materials and tools being used. It's integrating the surface with the image/idea that gives her such pleasure. The language of an artist and a weaver is the same; line, form, color, texture, shape, light, space, just our tools are different.

town family coming and going the peace and quiet will be odd, well odd but welcome.

I just wove off the last scarf that was on one loom, another loom was emptied in early December then folded up so that company could sleep in the studio. I now have two empty looms and before I dress either of those two looms I am going to finish weaving off that warp on the basement loom that has been bothering me. Yesterday I faced the project my large triangular loom. I started that



project over three years ago and if I haven't finished it yet it isn't going to happen. I had to admit that I just don't have a good place for that loom in my current situation. I unwove the six or so rows that I had done and took the loom apart. It is now on the floor with my extra reeds under my big loom. Maybe in my next place I will have somewhere to hang it.

Yes, I need to start making plans for moving. I don't know about you, but I think that weavers should never ever move. However I am looking forward to this move. I am designing my new studio space and will hopefully have room for everything. I now have a large box in the basement into which I am putting "yarn that I will never use." I was always willing to take home the orphan yarn or fabric that people offered me. Now that I have to move it and store it I am getting pickier. I keep telling myself that just because the yarn is free doesn't mean that I have to weave with it. I also have to admit that some of my fabric scraps are just that, scraps and they can be thrown out. The idea is to get the space pared down so that the house can be shown.

Having bad weather is a great excuse to tackle those jobs that we don't want to do. For me I am going to get that last warp done so that I can weave the rugs for that very patient customer. I am also going through all of those boxes and bins in my basement. I have piles of bags in the basement; Goodwill, trash and recycle. My husband comes down and I tell him which bag goes where. It is freeing that those things that once seemed so important is no long so and I can let go. Then once I go through all of the basement and closets I can go back to my work and have fun. That is what is keeping me going when my looms are calling to me.

Elisabeth Hill has been weaving since 1995, and recently received her Master Weaver certificate from Hill Institute in Florence, MA. She says, "I am a make-y person according to my youngest son. I love to knit, spin, dye, sew and bake, but I love to weave most of all. I have a 36" Schacht floor loom, a 60" Harrisville rug loom and an 60" AVL "antique dobby 1" loom and . . . a very supportive husband."

Mystery Weave, Deflected Double Weave, Cell Weave- it has as many names as it does possibilities. In this workshop we explore the dramatic possibilities of deflected doubleweave. Students will be provided with a warp for their 8 or 12 shaft looms with full instructions for warping. We will begin class with a Powerpoint presentation that gives a detailed explanation of the structure with slides, drafts and many examples. Next we will experiment with the myriad variations possible on a single threading by changing our tie-up, treadling and weft colors to create a mini sampler. Finally we will choose a tie-up/treadling/colorway from our sampler to weave a scarf.

Equipment: 8 or 12 shaft pre-warped loom

The fee for the workshop is: \$170 for Michigan Weavers Guild members and \$200 for non-members.
